




A secret project by Year 5

The role has definitely helped me (as probably all the other Governors would agree) understand the challenges that the School faces from a different perspective, and think critically about how we can help tackle them. We each bring our own baggage of experience and expertise, which goes to enrich the support we're able to give to the wider OLS community. We're there to help the School deliver at its best for our kids, so I feel very privilege to play a part in it. Personally, I would love to strengthen the link between the school and the parent/carer community as that would help us do our work as Governors even better!"

School Improvement Priorities

As a school we are always striving to improve. At the beginning of the year we set ourselves some ambitious school priorities to better the education and care provided at Our Lady School. Governors, leaders and school staff have worked tirelessly towards our priorities and I would like to share some of the progress made to date:

-To further embed our whole school approach to the implementation of the curriculum.

Throughout the Spring term, school leaders have been monitoring teaching and learning across the curriculum. External review visits identified:

"Pupils can explain clearly how they are helped by their teacher to learn and remember mathematical ideas."

"The curriculum is carefully sequenced and is helping pupils to build on and develop their understanding."

"Teachers are choosing appropriate strategies to help embed pupils' knowledge and understanding."

- To develop existing practice within Reading & Writing to include more emphasis on the use of ambitious vocabulary and sophisticated language.

Early Years and Key Stage 1 children have continued to progress through the Little Wandle phonics program which is now embedded in our daily teaching practice. We welcomed parents to our workshop in February which was a great opportunity to share ideas about how you can support your child's early reading and writing skills at home.

Our new Steps to Read programme has been implemented in Year 2 and Key Stage 2 which has been a great success. We are already seeing the impact of this in the children's reading and writing.

Our focus on the use of ambitious vocabulary has brought the introduction of 'word of the day'. Hearing the Year 5 children answer the register with a sentence using the word 'distressed' was a little concerning at first until I realised the context! The Year 6 team shared their writing books during Trust joint moderation and the work the children are producing has been identified as a real strength across our Trust schools.

-To further develop the role of behaviour leads and mental health lead and ensure all staff are skilled in supporting children with social or emotional barriers to learning, especially our most vulnerable children.

We have two fully trained behaviour leads in school, Mrs Hobbs and Miss McNabola. They have led staff training across the school on our therapeutic approach to behaviour management. Please see our updated behaviour policy which has been emailed to parents and is available on our school website. We have also provided a useful one page document which outlines the steps taken in school to address behaviour consistently.

Our annual mental health week (feel good week), regular RSHE lessons and weekly assemblies have reminded children and staff of the importance of keeping not only our bodies but also our minds healthy.

We continue to welcome new families to Our Lady School and the children have been excellent ambassadors in providing them with a warm, respectful and kind welcome. As a school we pride ourselves on providing a safe and caring environment that aspires to meet the needs of every pupil despite their background because we know that every child is a child of God and every child deserves the right to a safe, happy child hood and education.
